

# Roberts Is Reelected: Hines Loses At Minco

Rush Springs voters reelected one councilman in Tuesday's election, all other officials having been reelected without opposition. In Minco, the incumbent Ward 1 councilman, J. B. Hines, was defeated for reelection by five votes.

Dave Roberts, Ward 2 councilman, was reelected over his opponent, Jackie O. McClure, 144-87.

Hines, seeking reelection to the Minco City Council, was defeated by Cecil C. Reed, 26-21.

These were the only races in city elections in Grady County.

Ed Mehler was elected president of the town board in Cement after having been elected Ward 3 councilman over two other opponents. Mehler succeeds Bob Jackson as the town board president. Jackson seeking reelection to the board from Ward 2 was defeated.

Ward 4 councilman: W. L. Dawson, 167; Mrs. Ethel Wood, 145.

Former Oklahoma City mayor James Norick was returned

to the office Tuesday by a margin of 782 votes out of 44,420 cast, defeating Ray Ackerman, candidate of the Association for Responsible Government.

In the Oklahoma City council race, ARG candidates won three of the four seats. They were Patience Latting, Ward 2; Ben Franklin, Ward 6, and Cook, Ward 8. John M. Smith, an independent, won in Ward 5. Mrs. Latting is the first woman elected to the council.

"I will get along with ARG councilmen very well as long as they go into office with the

Kelsey, Waynoka; Charles Dudley, Alva; Wayne Pack, Miami; Bill Kerbow, Poteau; Lewis Cleo Wilson, Commerce; H. E. Holden Williams, Stilwell; Joe Rigsby, Sallisaw; A. L. Johnston, Anadarko; Carl Bode, Geary; Marvin Threadgill, Watonga; Lyman Tinker, Haileyville; Wayne Gilley, Lawton; Lewis C. Wilson, Commerce, and Harold McLain, Picher.

Voters in Sand Springs defeated a proposal that would have approved establishment of a local urban renewal authority. Mayor John Hess said he was disappointed with the light voter turnout, saying only 10 per cent of those registered cast ballots.

A \$160,000 bond issue for improvement and expansion of the fire department was defeated in Yukon, and a \$230,000 bond issue for an 18 - bed hospital addition was approved in Laverne.

Haileyville voters approved a one-cent city sales tax, but voters in Hennessey rejected a similar proposal.

# Bradley Water System Ready

Residents of Bradley can now begin using water from the new-constructed, 85-foot tower, it

was announced. The final inspection was held Thursday with contractors, engineers and members of the water board in attendance.

The Oklahoma State Board of Health has approved the water from two drilled wells located in the northeast section of the town near the elementary school.

Nine fire hydrants are being provided by the system for greater fire protection. Paul Schofield is the resident operator and manager of the water system.
