An ex-coal hauler writes to a Kansas City paper that the average weight of a ton of coal in this city is 1700 pounds. The purchaser pays for a full ton, and gets it short 300 pounds. The coal company buys by the long ton of 2200 pounds, sells by the short ton 2000 pounds and delivers a fraudulent ton of 1700 pounds. But this is in Kansas City—Anmoreite.

It is refreshing to the people of this section to know that this is the practice in Kansas City only.

A RELIEF MEASURE.

Both committees on Indian affairs have favorably reported bill authorizing the issuance of bonds by towns in the Indian Territory, for school purposes, water works, etc. The bill as it will become a law will provide that any city in the territory, having a population of one thousand or more is authorized to issue bonds and borrow money thereon, to be used for the construction of sewers and water works, and the building of such school houses, such bonds not to exceed an amount, the interest of which is five per cent per annum, would be liquidated by a tax of five mills on the dollar of the valuation of the taxable property, in each city or town, to be ascertained by the last assessment for purpose of taxation.

It is also provided that before any bonds can be issued, they must be authorized by a two-thirds majority vote of the qualified voters of each city at an election to be called for that purpose. Even then, however, the bonds cannot be issued until it is made to appear to the satisfaction of the judge of the United States court for the judicial district in which the municipality is located,

by petition of the mayor and council thereof, that all the requirements of the law have been complied with. When this has been done, the judge is directed to enter it upon the minutes of his court's judgment or decree, reciting the facts as he finds them to be.

In towns taking advantage of this law must provide for an annual tax sufficient to pay the interest on the bonds as it falls due, and also to pay the principal within twenty years from the date of the contracting of the obligation. In the event that any municipality has already received authority under any special act of congress to issue bonds, the amount so issued shall be deducted first, and there shall only be issued under this act such additional bonds as shall not exceed the limit provided.
